New Australian films are in plentiful supply at the moment, this week sees the release of Ben C Lucas' WASTED ON THE YOUNG, a reference to the Oscar Wildin quote about youth. It's set in the world of a privileged private school in Petrh where Zack, ALEX RUSSELL, and his cohorts Brookle, T. J. POWER and Shay, PATRICK CULLEN - call the shots. They're champions of the swimming dub. Zack's stephorother Darren is the studious type. When pretly blonde Xandrich, DACLADIC CLEMENS, shows an interest in Darren, Zack's ego is pricked. He decides to short circuit that relationship at a drug-fuelled party he gives.

When a second tragedy happens Darren plots his revenge

This is a most accomplished debut by Ben Lucas. The film looks extraordinary, Dan Freene's cinematography's terrific, giving the film a slightly surreal look that perfectly suits this world without any adults at all. As Xandrie says at one point, 1 don't know whether you've noticed but this place len't real - it's like a parallel universe'.

And the use of sound adds to that feeling of unreality. The young performers, whom I habin't seen before, were just sturning. Adelaide Glemens is heading for standom, she handles addictut rise with sour grace. But I was also impressed by Apke Russell and I. J. Power. If there is a criticism of the film it is that it takes you a while to get the hang of the differing time frames at the beginning and my technological dumbness is so extreme it took me a couple of minutes to really get into the ending.

This dramatic tale of that sense of entitlement that some people have to get away with any violation, and revenge via modern media is an absolute winner for me.

DAVID: There's so much talent here. I think, as you've said, the direction, the cinematography, the actors from an unknown cast to me, all very storag and very good. My problem is one of conclusion. I think images exemities eliminates get or close to the material during the editing phase, that they don't slep back and see that for somebody seeing it for the first time, does this make sense? Can you make that transition? And I'm afraid there were moments when I couldn't. The scenes which are supposed to be what someone is thinking an ese it with as much literalness as we're seeing everything else, there's no differentiation between a thought and a real action.

MARGARET: But, you see, I didn't have any problem after, say, 10 minutes figuring out time zones and I think the pitch of this film that is just beyond reality lets it get away with that really well. I did not have...

DAVID: It was a problem for me. It really was.

MARGARET: Well, that's a shame because...

DAVID: It's not a huge problem because I can see the strengths of the film. I just found it unnecessarily confusing and that was what pulled me back from it.

MARGARET: I just - I love the way it's shot. Those swimming sequences.

DAVID: Oh, it's beautiful.

MARGARET: They're sort of like really surreal and almost ominous.

DAVID: It's very, very strikingly done. I agree with you.

MARGARET: Yes. I'm giving it four stars. I think it's another Australian talent and the trouble is that he's gone to Los Angeles already. We no sooner produce them than they're stolen from us.
